An excerpt from the ISC's latest monthly report

As of October 1, 2025, our Refugee Mission will be reduced to only two programs, the Ukrainian Refugee Support Services (URSS) to serve Ukrainian refugees who came here through the Uniting For Ukraine (U4U) Program, and the Refugee Support Services (RSS), to serve refugees of all national origins, including Afghan SIV's (Special Immigrant Visa beneficiaries), who came here through the National Refugee Assistance Program.

Having **lost nearly 75% of our government funds**, each of the remaining eight members of our Refugee Mission, having accepted a sizable salary cut, is determined to do our best to help as many needy refugees become self-sufficient and integrated into our mainstream community as possible.

As usual, when things are dark, unbearable, and desperate, we lean on our faith to comfort us and lift us through those terrible challenges. Hope and faith are what sustain us. We say a prayer, we wipe our tears, we get up on our feet, and we go back to work.

Our refugee work in the communities across the central region of Pennsylvania is urgently needed during these depressing times. Please do not forget us in your prayers.

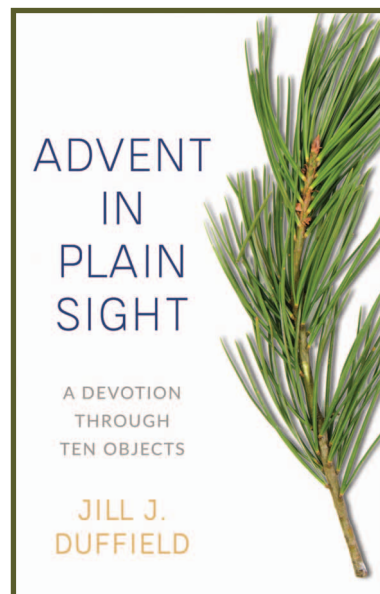

At Christmas, God came into our ordinary world in the form of a child, and still today, God is at work through the ordinary stuff of life, if we train our eyes to see. The book, *Advent in Plain Sight*, draws readers' attention to ten ordinary objects that appear in the biblical narratives of messianic prophecy and incarnation. Through focusing on these objects, we can see the near kingdom of heaven on earth and ponder what that divine proximity enables and asks us to do and be.

This year our church will use the seasons of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany to facilitate conversation and connection to each other and the meaning of this time in the church year. The goal of this group study will be to focus on spiritual lessons and recognize how the seemingly ordinary can reveal the extraordinary presence of God in our lives.



Dr. Truong Receives Award



PennLive's 2025 Peace & Justice in PA award was presented at the 2025 Peace and Justice in PA forum that was held on October 21 at the Kulkarni Theatre on the campus of Penn State Harrisburg.

Dr. Phuong Truong, Executive Director of the International Service Center, received the individual award for *"his profound trust in American ideals and his dedicated leadership in helping thousands of refugees settle in Central Pennsylvania for almost five decades."*

Radical trust in the One who sends you is needed because you are not to stuff your belt with all the things you think will keep you safe and apart from the pain of those you encounter along the way." CHILDREN & YOUTH

Nursery Care

On Sundays, nursery care is available for children (infants through 5-year-olds) in our Nursery (Level 4). The nursery is staffed by Sidney Dame, our Child Caregiver, and volunteers. The nursery opens at 10:45 a.m.

Sunday School

During the 11:00 a.m. worship service, Sunday School is offered in the Children's Education Room (Level 4) for children in Kindergarten-5th grade. Children will begin the worship service with their parents and be taken up to the Education Room by the Sunday school teachers following the children's sermon. We use the *Feasting on the Word* lectionary based curriculum which explores the same scriptures we do in worship on Sunday morning through games, crafts, and stories!

Children's Prayer Breakfast

On the second Sunday of each month children are invited with their families to enjoy some chocolate chip pancakes at 9:30 a.m. followed by a brief lesson. This year we're exploring our God questions. From "When was God born?" to "What does God look like?" to "What is God doing?" we'll have lots of fun learning how to wonder about God!

Youth Sunday School

Sunday school for children in grades 6-12 is offered in conjunction with Pine Street Presbyterian Church. Sunday School starts at 9:15 a.m. at Little Amps Coffee Shop on State Street. Youth and Leaders will walk back to Market Square together after class, arriving at the church between 10:00-10:15 a.m. This year we'll be using the *Faith Questions* curriculum from the PC(USA) to guide conversations about how Scripture and theology intersect with every day questions about life.

Weekly Bible Study

Our weekly Sunday morning Bible Study will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Youth Room on the 4th floor. This study will be discussion based and designed to help us build connections in our lives. We'll connect scripture with our daily lived experience, connect with one another, and connect with God. This study will be led by Elders John Dame and Kevin Burrell and will follow the lectionary.

Lunch and Learn

If early mornings are not your thing, join us following worship on the first Sunday of each month from October to May to share a light lunch and a robust conversation about theological and scriptural topics. The next Lunch & Learn is November 2 in the Conference Room.

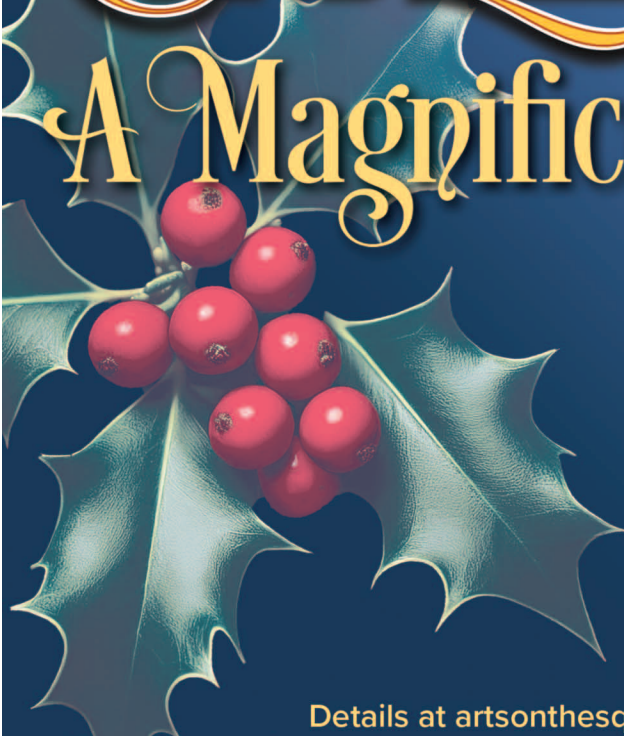

1) Approved Communion dates for 2026. These include:

Faith and Justice

2) Approved signing an open interfaith letter to Senators Fetterman and McCormick urging them to reconsider their negative assumptions about people who advocate for Palestinian human rights; but, instead, to support responses to antisemitism that are robust, fair, and rooted in universal rights rather than selective repression.

3) Designated the 2025 Christmas Eve offering for the Market Square Homelessness Initiatives Fund. Background: For the past four years, Session designated the Christmas Eve offering to benefit the Market Square Homelessness Initiatives Fund.

4) Agreed to waive the Harrisburg Harp Orchestra's holiday concert church rental fees for Sunday, December 7 in the afternoon, with concert proceeds used to support the church's "Feed the Hungry" fund at Market Square. Background: The Harrisburg Harp Orchestra contacted Tyler Canonico-Dilley about the possibility of holding their holiday program at Market Square on Sunday, December 7 in the afternoon. They would like to have their concert be a benefit concert. If Market Square agreed to waive its rental fees, their proceeds would benefit the church's Feeding the Hungry fund. If we did not wish to waive the church's rental fees, the proceeds would benefit Bethesda Mission.

Membership

5) Recognized the death of Dr. Barton Philipps died on September 17, 2025. He joined Market Square on September 30, 1966, and was ordained a deacon on January 26, 1969. His funeral service was held at Minnich Funeral Home in Millersburg.

6) Recognized the death of Victoria Rose who died on October 18, 2025. She joined Market Square on September 17, 2024. A memorial service will be held in the sanctuary on Saturday, October 25, officiated by the Rev. Anne M. Ross.

Finance

7) Agreed to recommend a budget of \$600 in Session contingency expenses for the year 2026 to the Coordinating Cabinet.

Nominating Committee

8) Authorized the Clerk of Session, staff, and Nominating Committee Chair to set a congregational meeting date before the end of the year for the purpose of electing trustees.

Rev. David Black, Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Chicago, is a former member and was a seminarian-under-care at MSPC. Later, he served as our as Minister of Outreach before relocating to Chicago.

In late September, Pastor Black was struck seven times by exploding pellets containing a chemical agent in an unprovoked attack. At the time, he was standing in a traditional Christian posture of prayer and blessing before ICE agents.

His mother, Marti Black, a regular visitor at MSPC, provided an update for people who ask her about David.

"He says he's recovering. Last Sunday in his sermon he said that after he'd been shot, when he'd fallen incapacitated to the ground, others selflessly took more shots intended by ICE for him. While medics were helping him, ICE came over and did a kettle maneuver and sprayed him with so much mace that he was soaking wet from head to toe. Even his socks inside his shoes were drenched with mace. Mace is also known as bear spray, to deter bears that are attacking a person.

"Dave was incapacitated and totally vulnerable and had been peacefully, lovingly praying for them, and these federal officials did this to him. Mace is painful! And the pepper balls fired at him by ICE from the rooftop at 200mph, manufactured in IL, have a warning on the packaging in large print that these can cause death. It's illegal to fire these at a person's head, yet he was hit twice on his head. Someone said this is similar to paintball, but for paintball a person wears protective gear over the whole body, including a helmet, and the paintball projectiles are not toxic (I hope). So if ICE is doing this and abducting legal citizens off the street in broad daylight, we must shudderingly hold in prayer all those held captive in darkness inside ICE detention centers like the one in Broadview IL.

"If you Google Rev. David Black, his recent interviews will come up. Praise the Lord for how the Gospel is being proclaimed out of all this and we see Romans 15:13 happening. He told us last night that news outlets are basically asking him to share the Gospel, and people are contacting him about feeling less disillusioned with "church" and maybe even beginning to attend church. Lord, bring Acts 26:18 into being in each life!"

Ecology Action Committee

On Monday, September 29, PennFuture and Conservation Voters of PA collaborated to hold a Lobby Day at the PA Capitol. Concerned Pennsylvanians from all corners of the state attended. They met with House Representatives to encourage them to support several bills that will impact energy efficiency, stormwater runoff that contributes to water pollution, clean energy solutions, and more. Two of those bills are summarized here. We request that you notify your PA House Representative in support of these bills – the Representative who presented the bill is indicated and spoke at a Press Conference that day to explain the bill to those attending.

House Bill 894 – Veterans Entering the Sustainability Sector Act. Rep. Joe Webster who serves the 150th District (part of Montgomery Co.)

- **Background:** Veterans possess many of the skills that positions within the sustainability sector require. Working in the field of conservation, clean energy, water quality or agriculture requires technical expertise, discipline, problem-solving, teamwork and resource management. State agencies and labor organizations across PA have cited a lack of qualified applicants as one of the primary reasons for delays in clean energy deployment and land restoration.
- **This bill:**
 - seeks to connect former members of the military with employment opportunities in the conservation and clean energy sectors. It establishes the Veterans Entering the Sustainability Sector Program (VETSS) within the Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED) to provide veterans with apprenticeship training and an opportunity to enter the sustainability workforce. Potential employment would be in solar installation, wind turbine technician, energy efficiency, forestry and land management, and water resources.
 - establishes the VETSS grant within the Treasury Department. This grant is for employers within the sustainability sector that hire veterans that have been referred by the VETSS Program.

• Key benefits:

- Help fill critical positions that will expand PA's energy portfolio, combat climate change, and promote economic growth.
- Underemployment is one of the greatest issues that veterans can face following their service, with nearly 1/3 of veteran job seekers underemployed. This bill will help veterans make their occupational transition into good-paying, family-sustaining sustainability jobs.



House Bill 1260 – Solar-ready Warehouses Rep. Josh Siegel who serves the 22nd District (Allentown area)

- **Background:** The rise of e-commerce has led to significant expansion of warehouse and distributions centers in PA. And PA is experiencing a dramatic surge in electricity demand driven by the growth of data centers, electric vehicles, and electrification of heating and cooling systems.
- **This bill aims to:**
 - establish new standards for the construction of warehouses (at least 40% of new build roof space must be suitable for solar panel installation).
 - provides incentives for retrofitting existing warehouses to facilitate solar installation (allows tax exemptions related to increased property value from solar ready retrofits).
- **Key benefits:**
 - Create job opportunities in the construction and maintenance of solar installations, boosting local economies.
 - PA can increase its electricity supply, making it a practical solution for meeting rising energy demands.

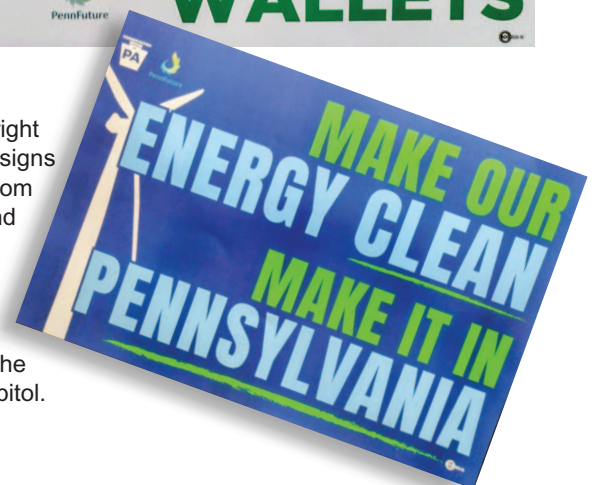
