To start the New Year I want to highlight how spreading the news of all the good work that God is doing at Market Square can lead to even more opportunities for ministry. One of the first things I did when I got here was look for a new doctor. When I finally was able to get an appointment the doctor asked me what I did for a living and I told him. He got very excited and let me know that he had heard about all the good work with the unhoused going on at Market Square and had wanted to do a free clinic for a very long time.

Dave Volkman and I met with Dr. Rahul Shenoy, talked about details, agreed to a trial that coming Sunday, and that first trial run turned out to be a great success! At its next meeting Session, after addressing details such as insurance and security in the building, agreed to invite Dr. Shenoy to lead a free clinic once a month on Sunday mornings during breakfast. In his first official clinic Dr. Shenoy and his husband, with support and logistics from Ben Perez and volunteers, provided physical exams, diagnoses of basic medical and mental health conditions, blood glucose checks, preventative health and nutrition education, mental health counseling, and referrals to clinics and social services. 15 individuals met with him during his time here. That's 15 people who desperately needed care who received it. And how many more will receive care each month? (Because of our limited capacity, spots to see the doctor are limited to our guests. If you need assistance please contact one of the pastors.)

Not only do I think everyone needs to know how God keeps opening doors to opportunities to make a difference in our community, but that this specific opportunity came about because people are talking about our church. As Presbyterians sometimes we are reluctant to toot our own horns—and that is appropriate—no one needs more braggarts. But that doesn't mean we should be shy about letting the world know what God is doing in this place. The more people know, the more people want to be a part of what God is doing here—and the more doors open. Let's get everyone talking about Market Square (and for all the right reasons!)

We are living in cynical times when we are lied to, basic norms of human decency are violated daily, and the loudest Christian voices in the public square for decades now have been voices of exclusion, hatred, and bigotry. If we are truly to be a beacon of hope on the square—a light unto the nations—witnesses to the gospel truth that things do not have to be this way—then we need to raise our own voices in the public square. Our community desperately needs hope—and that is something we can bear witness to. Hope is a discipline, a practice, and with patience it bears fruit—and this street medicine free clinic is just one example of what hope looks like in fruition. So I encourage you to go tell it on the mountain. Shout it from the rooftops. Let all know that the light shines in the darkness and is not overcome. God is doing such amazing things at Market Square Presbyterian Church—let's spread the good news about all those amazing things—because our community sure could use some good news! And who knows what amazing new opportunities to make our corner of the world a little brighter will come of it?

The city's parking garages are updating their entrance and exit system, and **PAPER TICKETS ARE NO LONGER NEEDED.**



Adult Forum

January 4 - Advent in Plain Sight: Final session

On January 4th we'll conclude the 6 week journey with Jill Duffield's devotional *Advent in Plain Sight*. We'll discuss the meaning of Epiphany and reflect on the season of waiting and welcoming Christ into our midst.

January 11 and 18 - Paul & the Margins: Case Studies from Corinth

Dr. Emerson Powery, Messiah University
Jan. 11: Paul & Women Christ-followers of Corinth
Jan. 18: Paul & Enslaved Christ-followers of Corinth

This adult forum presentation and discussion encourages participants to wrestle with several passages from First Corinthians in which Paul engages those members on the "fringe" of the Christian community in Corinth. Participants will come away with important lessons for interacting with those on the margins in our contemporary world.

Dr. Emerson Powery (pictured above left) is Professor of Biblical Studies and the Dean of the School of Arts, Culture & Society at Messiah University. He has published widely, most recently *Who is My Neighbor? Luke 10 for the Life of the Church* and *The Genesis of Liberation: Biblical*



Interpretation in the Antebellum Narratives of the Enslaved. He is the General Editor of the Society of Biblical Literature's *Early Christianity and Its Literature*, and the Executive Editor of the Westminster Study Bible. He holds a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. in Early Christian Origins from Duke University.

January 25 - Conflict in Palestine/Israel

This one-day class, led by Dr. Bob Ross, will introduce attendees to the politics, history, and geography of Palestine/Israel. Our discussion will address where, what, and who Palestine, Palestinians, Israel, and Israelis are and why they have been periodically fighting for the past 100 years. Special attention will be given to the role that the church has and could play in this often deadly political-geographic struggle.

Dr. Bob Ross (pictured above right) is Associate Professor of Global Cultural Studies and Social Justice Studies at Point Park University in Pittsburgh. He is on the steering committee of the Israel Palestine Mission Network of the PCUSA. He has published articles on the Palestinian call for boycott, divestment, and sanctions and its relationship to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in Unbound, Presbyterian News Service, Presbyterian Outlook, and Mondoweiss. He is also the son of our beloved Rev. Anne Ross!

Atrium Flowers by Alice Hamilton

I received an email from church asking for people to sign up for flowers in the atrium. I signed us up thinking, "Sure, we haven't given flowers in a while. Sign us up." What I did not realize was that I missed the key word in that email: "atrium."

I know Anna Johnston usually sits at the bench admiring the Atrium flowers every Sunday and watching people's eyes to see if they look at the flowers on the way to the sanctuary. One morning I sat with her, and she told me that many people never stop to check out the arrangements. I told her that I look every Sunday. Her reply? "I know." She explained the history of how this presentation started and has continued, and she stressed that the whole purpose is to share our gardens with each other, NOT to purchase an arrangement from a flower shop.

I know people in the past have presented some beautiful flowers for the atrium from their backyards, but this was the end of November, and I panicked. I looked out at my yard, and my flowers had recently given up fighting against the few frosty mornings. I did not see a flower anywhere; everything was limp. What was I thinking? I figured I would have to go to a flower shop or Trader Joe's in order to present anything inspiring to the faithful in attendance on a Sunday morning. Now Anna was telling me what not to do. I was stumped.

For about two weeks, I walked my property daily looking for hopeful prospects. I was discouraged, but one day, I truly felt



the Holy Spirit nudge me. Most of you who know me well know that I do believe in nudges, and I have learned to listen and act accordingly. The voice clearly said, "STOP. LOOK."

My view and perspective changed that morning as I quietly looked around me and instead of bare branches and limp flowers, I saw bushes with vibrant reds and oranges and greens. I saw berries and ornamental grasses that swayed in the wind with tassels of soft browns. I even saw one little bud on my hardy mum. It was then that I got excited, and every day, as I thought about this project, I looked at the earth's changing options of a different kind of beauty. 

BRING YOUR ORAL CARE PRODUCTS WASTE *By Janet Bargh*

The Ecology Action Committee (EAC) supports the MSPC Earth Care Congregation pledge which states that we will be humble stewards of the earth and will protect it and restore it. As a new initiative, EAC members are now offering congregants the chance to be earth stewards by bringing oral care product waste to the church where it will be conveniently and responsibly disposed of. EAC members will then ship the collected waste to Terra Cycle, the company working with Colgate© to recycle these items into new materials. We especially like this program because an important solution to overproduction of plastics is for companies that make the products to be responsible for the costs of disposal.

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS:

1. Bring oral care products' waste to church.
2. Drop them in the designated bin located in the atrium.
3. EAC members will routinely pick up the contents and will ship them free to Terra Cycle.
4. All that collected waste is not entering the waste stream.

toothbrushes, toothpaste

In December, Session's activities included:

Faith and Justice

1) Agreeing to become one of the Presbyterian Church USA's Matthew 25 congregations. Background: According to the PCUSA Matthew 25 website (<https://pcusa.org/matthew25>): "This transformative movement calls on...congregations...to live out the church's mission through bold and compassionate discipleship. Rooted in Jesus' teachings in Matthew 25:31-46, this movement invites you to engage in three core pillars: building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty.

The Matthew 25 vision builds from the theme of wholeness or peace – shalom in the Hebrew text and eirene in the Greek – and orients us toward what we are building, cultivating, and creating with God in lives and communities. We build beloved communities in part by dismantling the harm caused by racist structures. We cultivate economic wholeness when we act to eliminate the destructive influence of poverty on people and communities. These actions can welcome abundant life, equity, and hope in our shared journey.

2) Approving the collection of the Christmas Joy Offering on December 21, 2025. Background: This is a special Offering of the PC (USA) that supports our leaders past, present, and future. 100% of the offering is sent to Presbytery Mission Agency.

3) Recognizing the death of Deacon Roger Olson who died on December 7, 2025 at the age of 90. Roger joined Market Square on December 22, 2018. He was ordained a deacon at Pine Street Presbyterian in January 1972. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, January 10 at Market Square, officiated by the Revs. Anne M. Ross and Sandra Strauss.

4) Approving the Rev. Allison Smith's covenant of agreement for full-time employment in calendar year 2026.

5) Adopting a balanced budget for 2026. It includes about \$1.2 million in expenses.

6) Accepting a \$26,339 unrestricted gift from the Mapp Family Fund to be used in the area of most need. The family will be thanked for their generosity.

7) As recommended by the Trustees, approving a purchase price increase for the right of inurnment in Market Square Church's columbarium from \$1200 to \$1500. Background: The \$1200 price was originally set in December 2008. Due to a \$200 increase in the price of nameplates for the niches, the Trustees recommend that we increase the price of niches by \$300 to cover the increased price, and to allow for likely additional increases in the future.




Arts on the Square Gallery will open a new exhibition at Market Square Presbyterian Church on Sunday, January 19, 2026, featuring works by artists **Mindy Deardorff** and **Sherryl Heberlig**.

"Faces and Places: Works by Mindy Deardorff and Sherryl Heberlig" will be on display through Sunday, April 19, 2026, in Market Square's soaring Geneva Hall gallery space on the 4th floor and in the 2nd floor atrium adjacent to the sanctuary. In addition to Sunday mornings, the gallery spaces will be open for 30 minutes following Arts on the Square concerts throughout the season.

A free exhibit opening reception in Geneva Hall on January 18 will introduce the artists' work from 12:00 noon – 1:30 pm. Market Square Presbyterian Church is located at 20 S. Second Street in downtown Harrisburg. Free parking is available in the city parking garage adjacent to the church.

Spouses who are lifelong residents of the Harrisburg area, Mindy's portrait drawings and Sherryl's photography explore interesting characters and evocative settings. Both of these prolific artists have had a lifelong passion for art and creativity – Mindy has been drawing since childhood; Sherryl picked up flashcubes and film as a youngster, becoming serious about photography in 2004.

"My works are mostly portraiture because I've always been fascinated with the human face," says Mindy, adding that her creative mission is "to convey all of the beauty that is found in the human face, from young to old." Sherryl is also inspired to capture the human form, reflecting that she is "more of a street photographer" who enjoys "taking photos of people within their environment." Sherryl likes what she describes as the "cinematic feel" of color photography, but loves black & white photography: "To me it feels like a distinct way of seeing the world. It has an emotive impact and a certain timelessness."

Faces & Places: Works by Mindy Deardorff and Sherryl Heberlig

Market Square member Kathy Marley-Dunbar recommended Mindy and Sherryl for the Arts on the Square gallery. She has known them and admired their expertise for years: "I'm really drawn to the humanity, kindness, and artistic expression revealed in their works," says Kathy.

Both artists have received numerous awards for their works of art and have participated in group exhibitions and juried shows at the Art Association of Harrisburg, the Susquehanna Art Museum, Carlisle Arts Learning Center, The Art Center School and Galleries in Mechanicsburg, Harrisburg Area Community College, and Harrisburg's Martin Luther King, Jr., City Government Building, among many other venues.

Mindy describes herself as a self-taught artist who works in charcoal, graphite, and watercolor. Retired from a career with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, she shares her expertise at the Art Association of Harrisburg as an instructor in portraiture.

The Arts on the Square Committee of Session is pleased to share that in December 2025 our ministry completed its \$50,000 pledge to the *Restore, Renew, Rejoice!* campaign at Market Square to help finance the organ and sanctuary project. Through the generosity of many concert-goers, sponsors and grantors, the Friends of Arts on the Square, and by leveraging upfront support for concerts from some special funds earmarked for the music program, the 5-year pledge was completed just a little later than originally planned, due to the impact of the pandemic.

We certainly would like to acknowledge the tremendous extra administrative work by Market Square's financial and other staff as well as volunteers that have made Arts on the Square a success.




