Children's Ministry

Children of all ages are always welcome! There are two shelves in our Narthex (at the back of the Sanctuary) with sequin boards, crayons, markers, coloring sheets, and puzzles as well as a few library books that go along with the theme of the worship service. On typical Sundays immediately following the children's sermon (around 11:15 a.m.), education for children K-6 is offered in the Children's Education Room (Level 4). On Sundays, nursery care is available for children (infants through 5-year-olds) in the nursery on the fourth floor. The nursery is staffed by Sidney Dame, our nursery caregiver, and volunteers.

Parking: Get Validated

Because the garage isn't owned by the church, we're only able to cover parking when license plates are validated. So each time you arrive, please stop by and share your plate number with a staff member.

Blood, Bones, Dirt, Stone & Paper: Reclaiming Black Love in the Civil War

Rachael Keri Williams traces how Black love is revealed across battlefields, refugee routes, labor, caregiving, enlistment, and Civil War pension application files—through the ongoing reclamation of Harrisburg's Historic Lincoln Cemetery. Grounded in multi-state genealogical research and USCT records, this presentation brings audiences into the lived networks of Black families: the evidence preserved in paper, the names made legible again in stone, and the stories reassembled through painstaking restoration work. Williams shares genealogies, never-before-seen photographs, and the tangible process of recovering headstones that were buried and invisible—work that has helped reunite living descendants in Harrisburg, across Central Pennsylvania, and around the country with their ancestors' legacies. In this telling, love is not abstract: it is caregiving, survival, documentation, and return—families finding each other again across generations.

Music this week

We begin worship with Austin Lovelace's "Passacaglia and Fughetta on 'Abbot's Leigh.'" Austin explores the tune through contrasting movements – a stately passacaglia built over a repeating bass line, a concise and playful fughetta, and a joyful ending. An interesting setting of this well-known tune, but yet he brings a fresh depth and vitality to the piece.

Our processional hymn, "Come, Great God of All the Ages" pairs a contemporary text by Ruth Duck with the wonderful tune *Abbot's Leigh*, composed by Cyril Taylor. Ruth's text traces God's faithful presence across time – past, present, and future – naming God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer while calling the church to live boldly in the world God loves. As we sing, let us reflect on God's enduring work and our shared calling within it.

The Sanctuary Choir's anthem, "True Light" by Keith Hampton is a radiant setting of text inspired by John 1, proclaiming Christ as the light that shines in the darkness and brings life to the world. Keith's music blends gospel warmth with classical choral writing, using rich harmonies, expressive dynamics, and a steadily growing intensity to mirror the text's movement from quiet revelation to confident proclamation.

The responsive hymn, "Together We Serve" celebrates the shared ministry of the church through a text by Daniel Charles Damon that emphasizes unity, service, and faithful discipleship. Set to the folk-influenced tune, *San Anselmo*, composed by Ron Klusmeier, the hymn's buoyant melody and accessible rhythm underscore the joy and energy of serving God side by side. With its repeated affirmation that "together" we worship, learn, and care for the world, this hymn reminds the congregation that Christian service is not a solitary calling, but a communal response to God's love.

Our offertory anthem, "The Light of the World" by British composer Andrew Carter is a lyrical choral anthem centered on Christ's words from the Gospel of John: "I am the light of the world." Carter's characteristically clear melodic writing and gently unfolding harmonies create a mood of reverence and assurance, allowing the text to shine with simplicity and warmth. The music moves from quiet reflection to confident affirmation, inviting us to contemplate Christ as the guiding light who dispels darkness and leads God's people in faith and hope.

"Today We All Are Called to Be Disciples" is a hymn of commissioning that joins a contemporary text by Omer Westendorf with the traditional English folk tune, *Kingsfold*. Westendorf's text names the everyday work of discipleship – listening, serving, seeking justice, and bearing Christ's love beyond the walls of the church – while calling believers to live the gospel with courage and compassion. Paired with the sturdy, familiar melody, the hymn grounds this modern call in a timeless musical setting, reminding the congregation that discipleship is both a daily practice and a lifelong journey of faith.

The closing voluntary, "This Little Light" was composed by jazz composer and musician Joe Utterback, and is a spirited and imaginative setting of the well-known and loved spiritual, "This Little Light of Mine." Drawing on jazz idioms – syncopated rhythms, blues-inflected harmonies, and playful variations – Joe transforms the simple melody into a work full of energy and character. While the tune remains clearly recognizable, it is heard through changing textures and colors that suggest both improvisation and joy! This setting celebrates the hymn's message of personal faith and witness, inviting us all to hear a well-loved song with fresh sparkle!

Music next week – The Sanctuary Choir will sing "This Is My Beloved Son" by David Evan Thomas and Jeremy Filsell's "The Transfiguration." The hymns for the morning will be, "Jesus, Take Us to the Mountain," "Swiftly Pass the Clouds of Glory," and "Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies."

SYNOPSIS OF THE PLAY

Miss Lydia's Church takes place in the middle of January 1924, in the middle of a snowstorm, in the middle of the night when four people, two sets of strangers, came together. Two were White; two were Black. Two were female; two were male. Two were steeped in religion; two were centered in astronomy. All were wishing for better relations between the races. What brought these strangers together? Was it a moon phase or a planetary shift or was it something deeper and farther away?

Miss Lydia's Church centers on the need to talk about the hard issues of racial relations in America, to face the fears that keep us silent, and to prepare a world for the next generations where all children are accepted and cherished. That was, after all, the **Dream** Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King challenged us to envision and create.

Leading the Audience Discussion, following the play reading, will be Dr. Scott Deisley, Interim Director. Crispus Attucks York History and Culture Center and Dr. Larry Walthour, Senior Pastor, Shiloh Baptist Church of York.
