# What is Climate Justice?



At Market Square we have heard about “environmental justice” and “climate justice” in our pastors’ sermons and prayers, in Adult Forums, in our Ecology Action Committee, and the Antiracism Task Force. Climate justice is needed both locally in PA and globally in the world.

In November at COP27, Rev. Dr. Nedly Astudillo, Green Faith Latin America Coordinator, and a member of the Presbyterian Hunger Program Advisory Committee, spoke to the World Council of Churches. She reminded them of the need for churches who engage in the struggle for climate justice to understand what the work for climate justice involves. What follows is from her statement.

*Climate justice is racial justice.*

*Climate justice is gender justice.*

*Climate justice is about welcoming those in need of shelter.*

*Climate justice is the right of future generations to live on a livable planet.*

*Climate justice is finance and reparations for communities most impacted and least responsible for climate change.*

*Climate justice is an immediate end to new fossil fuels and deforestation, an equitable phase-out of existing fossil fuel production, and a massive and generous commitment by rich countries to a just energy transition.*

If we at Market Square are to live out our mission to “work for justice, peace and a sustainable environment,” then climate justice must stand as a priority in our decisions, our projects, and our hearts.

## Like Losing A Library

I recently read a most fascinating book—*The Library Book* by Susan Orlean. The focus of this non-fiction work is the 1986 fire which greatly damaged much of the Los Angeles Central Public Library. There are many elements to this fascinating story, but one observation the author made jumped out at me. This is the observation—**everytime someone dies it's like losing a library.**

That thought grabbed me—and made me realize how much information each of us carries around in our heads—personal stories, skills and capabilities, remembrance of events—and on and on. This image—of each of us carrying a library's worth of knowledge, experiences, observations, adventures, and concepts—helps me understand why stories are so important to me.

One time, when our son was a little boy, we were riding in the car with my parents. As we traveled, my son began querying his grandparents. Very innocently, he asked what it was like when they were growing up. They were part of the generation that grew up during the Depression, and they had fascinating stories. For example, my dad said that sometimes they had only one kind of food in the house—for example potatoes. So they ate potatoes, breakfast, lunch and supper. My mother, whose family were farmers, fared a little better where food variety was concerned, but she told my son of making their own clothes...out of the cloth sacks that flour was delivered in. These stories were ones I had never heard—and would not have, had my son not asked *“what was it like to grow up during the Depression?”*

Many years later, when my mother had died unexpectedly, the suddenness of it hit our whole family hard, especially my father, who was then 72. To help him cope and begin to rebuild his life, we gave him a word processor. He immediately began writing his memoirs. And he labored long at that task—for many years. When he died (at age 98) he had finished those memoirs, but never published them.

Since I had a copy of what he had written, I began to wonder if I could edit and publish his memoirs in the historical journal of the church he belonged to. I set to the task and managed to curtail his tendency to chase down proverbial rabbit holes in his story telling. Eventually, I had a manageable 100 + pages which was published. The completion of that project gave me a sense of satisfaction—and it made me understand that I had saved a bit of the “library of his life.” In the process, I learned things about him, my mother, as well as stories about me and my siblings.

As we prepare to enter a new year, here's a thought. Perhaps you can write a bit of your own “library” or engage in conversation with someone, and capture some of their life's library.

Here are a few quick samples of questions to get you started—

**CHILDHOOD:** Describe the neighborhood you grew up in. What did you want to be when you grew up?

**ADULTHOOD:** What was your first job? What did you like most about it? And least about it?

**IDENTITY:** Who are three people in history you admire, and why?


Of course, the caution is—only embark on such a venture if it interests you. And, oh, make sure it interests those people you are questioning.

Market Square's Session is responsible for the church's mission, governance, and programs. Until the end of November, the Session was moderated by Pastor Tom Sweet. Upon Tom's retirement, Pastor Kim Wadlington now moderates the Session. Current Ruling Elders may serve up to two consecutive, three-year terms. Members are:

On November 15, 2022, Market Square's Session agreed to:

## Personnel

- Express the Session's thanks and profound gratitude to Pastor Tom Sweet for his ministry and great appreciation to Lori for the wonderful gifts she brought to Market Square.
- Engage the Reverend Allison Smith as a part-time Associate Pastor at Market Square through a Covenant Agreement for Temporary Pastoral Relationships.
- Modify Tom and Lori Sweet's mortgage note with the church to provide a credit of \$30,000.

## Ecology Action

4. Adopt the Ecology Action Committee's letter to Governor Tom Wolf expressing disappointment in his support of the *PA Economic Development for a Growing Economy Tax Credit* law. It provides \$2 billion in new tax breaks for fossil fuel industries. Background: The new tax credits support hydrogen production, milk processing, and biomedical research industries. No tax credits were included to encourage and support clean, renewable energy. Included in the act were \$1 billion in tax incentives to attract a "hydrogen hub" to PA. While hydrogen can be produced with clean energy, this bill instead creates a system of pipelines and compressor stations to convert fracked natural gas to hydrogen. While industrial and transportation projects can use the hydrogen without creating greenhouse gases, the fracking of natural gas and transportation to a facility to convert it to hydrogen will produce greenhouse gases. The bill also increases the existing methane tax credit by \$30 million to a total of \$56.5

million annually with the goal of encouraging the use of methane, one of the most long-lived greenhouse gases, to manufacture other products such as fertilizer and gasoline.

## Worship

- Approve the Worship, Music, and the Arts committee's proposed 2023 communion dates.

## Arts on the Square

- Approve the Arts on the Square committee's request to solicit patron program support for its arts programs. The letter drive to solicit this support will be conducted in coordination with other church committees.

## Membership

- Approve a certificate of transfer for Janice Herchelroath from Highland Presbyterian Church (Lancaster) to Market Square. Rationale: Jan joined Market Square in 2006 and transferred to Highland on June 21, 2017, which was closer to her home in Ephrata. She has expressed interest in returning to Market Square.
- Remove the following people from the list of active members:
  - Heather (7365) and April (7371) Gaither. Rationale: They moved to South Carolina and have not responded to numerous emails from the church.
  - Darla "Buffy" Buffington (7389). Rationale: Recent stewardship materials were returned to the church by the postal office as "unable to forward, address not known."
  - Sonia Dieter (5686). Rationale: Unknown address. Her mother, member Sally Dieter, indicated it was okay if the church removed her from its rolls.

## Governance

- Ordain and install new officers during Sunday morning worship, January 15, 2023, 11:00 a.m..
- Call the annual congregational meeting for January 29, 2023, immediately following worship for the purposes of receiving 2022 annual reports, reviewing the 2023 church budget and receiving a report regarding transition plans.

## AFGHANISTAN FAMILY RESETTLEMENT

A huge achievement occurred December 1; the Afghanzada family moved into a lovely and spacious townhouse in Mechanicsburg. This residence has three bedrooms and two and one-half baths. It is more suitable for a family of seven adults compared to their previous unit which had one bedroom and one bath. This achievement occurred after many, many hours on our part of running down leads, communicating with rental agents and landlords, and doing walk-through inspections of possible rentals. All of the family members took part in the move (the five men took off work) and we also were assisted by an ISC volunteer with a pickup truck.

Our Azizyar family is nicely settled in their apartment in Grantham. Our volunteers have stepped forward offering to help them with transportation and teaching English as a second language. We are working with the charity New Digs to get various household items for them including a clothes washer and clothes dryer. If anyone reading this has a used machine in good running condition

needing a new home, please contact me.
