How long does it take Presbyterians to select their next installed Head of Staff Pastor? In this case it took more than two and a half years. This slow process can feel frustrating, but it is now winding up with an exciting candidate to present to the congregation in July.

Let's review these final stages of the process. The Session approves the Pastor Nominating Committee's request for a candidating weekend and special congregational meeting. A mailing goes out with information about the candidate and how the Pastor Nominating Committee came to their decision that this candidate was the right match for our congregation.

On the weekend of the congregational meeting, the candidate guest preaches for the Sunday worship service. Following the worship, we will convene as a

congregation to discuss and vote on the candidate. The candidate will be dismissed from the sanctuary. The Pastor Nominating Committee will give its report. The congregation will be invited to ask questions of the Pastor Nominating Committee. The motion on the floor will be to elect the candidate to become the installed Head of Staff Pastor, with clear terms of call and a starting date. The vote will be taken by secret ballot. After the ballots are counted, the moderator will announce the results, and the candidate will be invited back into the sanctuary to hear the results of the vote. If all goes well, the congregation will applaud and sing the Doxology together.

I am excited for these final steps as your church moves into its future with hope and enthusiasm.

Pastor Nominating Committee Update

The Pastor Nominating Committee had been looking forward to sending the recent letter and brochure to members about our choice for head pastor since the first time we met this past April. We knew that when we completed our work, it would be our honor and immense pleasure to introduce to the members of Market Square the candidate to be our next head pastor that we believed the Spirit had made clear.

As we stressed in the mailing, the identity of our pastor candidate should not be shared online in any way since the selection process dictates that their current congregation is not informed of the plans until after our congregation votes on the new call. So no names will appear here since this newsletter appears not only in print but also online.

When we started our work, we decided upon certain qualifications, characteristics, and talents that we thought were necessary in a successful pastor for our church. It was a comprehensive list and one we worked on long and hard. That list raised an obvious question: Was there a person out there somewhere in the denomination with the pastoral experience, temperament, and potential to fill all those credentials? Then we met our candidate, and we learned that there was such a person of God seeking a new call that not only met those requirements but exceeded our expectations.

We are thrilled for you to meet this special person.

On July 5th, beginning at 4:00 p.m. and continuing until 5:00 p.m.,

there will be an informal reception for our candidate in Geneva Hall. This event will be an opportunity for you to meet and greet our choice, to hear from them at 4:15 p.m. when they will share remarks, and to ask questions. The PNC knows that the candidate is as excited to meet us as we are to meet them.

There will be refreshments provided. An RSVP is not required to attend, but it would be helpful if you would email sheets@marketsquare.org of your plans.

Candidating Sunday is the next day, July 6, when our candidate will lead the worship service and preach the sermon. Session has called a congregational meeting immediately after the service. After the PNC reports on our search, our unanimous choice, and the specifics on the terms of call, church members will vote on the candidate and the terms.

The work of the PNC is nearly finished. July 5th and 6th are the days your action is needed. Please plan on attending Saturday's reception, Sunday's service, and the congregational meeting. We are thrilled with the person you are soon to meet and thankful that our search has brought us all to this exciting moment.

News from the Trustees House Committee

The construction of Market Square dates back to the 1860's. It is a beautiful building that requires ongoing maintenance to keep it in good condition and to serve the needs of its congregation and neighbors in 2025 and beyond. The House Committee is dedicated to maintaining the building and prioritizing the work that needs to be done on it.

Witmer Restoration has been working on the second phase of our exterior masonry project. This has been a top priority, not only for the exterior aesthetics of the church, but most importantly to maintain the structural integrity of the building and water tight conditions. Witmer has been great to work with and is doing an excellent job for us. They expect to complete this phase of the work in late August/early September.

The Trustees has designated a list of projects with top priority. We considered security, monies available and need to be able to get

to these projects. The Trustees agreed at the June meeting the priorities are:

- Exterior Lighting
- Kitchen- to be phased in over a period of years
- Parlor - paint and rug.
- Interior Lighting for the Sanctuary
- Venting the protective window coverings for the stained glass windows (Potentially these could be done over a few years as money becomes available).
- Better lighting in Geneva Hall, fourth floor rooms and Fellowship Hall.

These projects are important and will be undertaken as monies become available.

A note from our friends at Heeding God's Call:

Dear Friends of Faith,

I'm writing to address a significant legislative development that requires our collective attention and action.

Recently, the US House of Representatives passed HR 1, the "One Big Beautiful Bill." While it encompasses various provisions, one aspect is particularly troubling: the elimination of the long-standing national prohibition on gun silencers.

As you may know, these devices, often referred to by the NRA as "suppressors," are proposed under the guise of hearing protection. However, the reality is that they can aid criminals by enabling them to carry out violent acts with stealth, posing a risk to our communities and law enforcement officers. Please read the article here.

This one impacts us all. The bill has moved to the Senate, presenting an important opportunity for Pennsylvania's senators, both Democrat and Republican, to come together and safeguard public safety.

Here's how you can help:

1. **Educate Yourself:** I encourage you to watch a brief video featuring remarks from Heeding God's Call's Executive Director on the implications of this bill, available at <https://tinyurl.com/3jt63zd5>.
2. **Reach Out to Senators:** Contact our US Senators: Dave McCormick at (202) 224-6324 and John Fetterman at 202.224.4254. Share your concerns and urge them, regardless of party affiliation, to oppose the One Big Beautiful Bill. Emphasize that public safety transcends political lines and that you are watching how they vote.
3. **Support Our Efforts:** Consider donating to Heeding. Your support helps us make a difference. We have been instrumental in the passage of legislation to universal background checks, lost or stolen reporting requirements, extremist protective orders, and one handgun a month. Please see below for more information.

Together, it our duty as a faith community to advocate for a safer future.

The service commemorates the 80th anniversary of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

PLASTICS – Yes! Again!

The Ecology Action Committee (EAC) is determined to present LOTS of information on the subject of plastics and the impacts they have on people, animals, the earth, the air we breathe, the food we eat, the water we drink, and on and on and on ...SO once again, this article will be about plastics!

During the entire “life cycle of plastics” we are exposed to pollution – from the release of methane and CO₂ in the extraction of oil and gas, through the processing of that oil and gas, to the litter caused by these plastics, the “dirty” disposal through incineration and landfill, and the degrading of plastics into microplastics. AND it is alarming to learn that there are over 13,000 chemicals used in the production of plastics – many of them end up in the food we eat, the water we drink, the air we breathe, the products we use, and on and on and on...And, according to a UN Environmental Program report, 880 BILLION POUNDS of plastic were made in 2024!!!

What happens to plastics? Our research found that:

- **32% ends up as litter** – in our neighborhoods, along our highways, in our rivers, along our coasts.
- **40% ends up in landfills**, leaching into the earth affecting the lands where farmers plant and animals graze and the waterways where sea life live, etc., thus entering the food chain!
- **14% is incinerated** leaving an ash residue that must be disposed of.
- **14% is “recycled,” BUT REALLY ONLY 6 % is effectively recycled** into something that can be used again AND plastics can only be recycled once at best!!!

There are 7 types of plastics, made by different processes, that are marked with the triangle that “implies it can be recycled.” In reality, there is only a cost effective way to reduce the numbered **1,2, and 4 plastics**.

#1 PET examples are water bottles, jars, caps.

#2 HDPE examples are shampoo bottles, laundry detergent containers, grocery bags.

#4 LDPE examples are bread bags and plastic films.

There is essentially no point in placing any other plastics in our recycling bins, because they will just need to be removed again at the recycling centers, there being no market for these products.

Microplastics are plastic particles ranging in size from 1 nanometer (a human hair can be 80 nanometers!!!) up to 5 millimeters in size (the width of a pencil eraser). They come from a variety of sources: toothpaste washed down our drains, spills of plastic pellets used in manufacturing, littering and dumping, microfibers washed down our drains when we launder clothing, fishing nets or lines, and on and on and on...According to an article by *The Guardian*, microplastic pollution has been discovered in snow close to the **peak of Mount Everest**, the world’s highest mountain and at the **Mariana Trench**, the deepest point on Earth.

HUMANITY’S PLASTIC LITTER HAS POLLUTED THE ENTIRE PLANET!!! EAC feels that it is imperative that we begin to decrease our reliance on plastics. And EAC committee members individually have begun to do so. We are interested in helping you “get started” – please ask one of us how.

Session Activities – June 2025 Activity Update

Market Square's Session is responsible for the church's mission, governance, and programs.

Pastor Bruce Humphrey moderates the Session. Current Ruling Elders may serve up to two consecutive, three-year terms.

A complete list of all church officers and committee members is available on the church website's Members Only section.

June's actions included:

Pastor Nominating Committee

1) Calling a congregational meeting for Sunday, July 6, 2025 following worship for the purpose of calling a pastor. The motion carried unanimously with affirmation and appreciation for the committee's hard work and dedication.

Music Ministry

2) Approving the construction of choral risers for the choir room suite at a cost of \$9000 for materials to be allocated from the recently established Carl Petersheim Music Program Fund. This will leave a balance of about \$47,000. **Background:** The choral risers will be built this summer by choir member Jon Sheppard who has extensive construction experience and is donating his labor. The risers will allow choir members to see the conductor when rehearsing and will accommodate chairs and people. They will be portable and will also be built high enough off the floor to allow for possible water infiltration.

3) Approving a grant application request of \$5000 for Arts on the Square music programming from the Presser Foundation.

Outreach and Marketing

4) Agreeing to use Health Allen Mission Funds to run monthly half-page ads in *The Burg* at an annual cost of \$9420.

Membership

5) Removing the following people from the church's membership rolls:

- a) Robert Harding
- b) William and Cynthia Petry
- c) Rebecca Schuchert
- d) Janet Bixler

6) Agreeing to personally contact 66 individuals who are not currently active at church. These individuals have already received several mailings requesting a response. Each Session member has been assigned 3 or 4 names. Contacts will be made by mid-July.

Administrative

7) Revising the operating guidelines for Session committees.

As of May 18, 2025, there were 366 members on the church membership rolls. If you have any questions about Session activities, you may talk with me, a Session member, or one of our Pastors.

Peacemaking Committee

Our Peacemaking Committee was excited to learn that a member of a Syrian family with whom we've been involved for at least 5 years just graduated from Cumberland Valley High School. Not only is Kholoud a star student, she completed what credits she needed for graduation at the end of her junior year, one year early! In her final year, she earned college credits by taking several college courses at HACC along with her required high school classes. One of her college courses was especially difficult, so she was nervous when the professor pulled her aside but then told her that in 20 years of teaching he had never had a student do so well on an exam!

Soon after we met Kholoud, we learned she had begged her mother when she was not yet in school to learn to read. That personal motivation persists. Kholoud will return to HACC as a freshman this fall. After completing her college education, her goal is to enter law school.

Kholoud's early years were spent in a refugee camp in Jordan before the family was able to immigrate to the US. Most of the family are now U.S. citizens. —Margee Kooistra
