"How can I say thanks for all the things you have done for me? To God be the glory." These words from an old popular Christian song by Andrew Crouch not only represent my prayer of thanksgiving for calling me to serve at Market Square, but also my appreciation for how this congregation has blessed me. Just as I hope a couple of my thoughts and perspectives might have encouraged you to grow in Christ, I need to let you know how your influence on me has helped me grow as well.

You have influenced me to become more participative in my resistance to injustices. For years I have led Bible studies and book discussions addressing anti-racism, anti-poverty, and social justice topics. But this congregation helped me step up my personal participation in resistance marches. Prior to coming to Market Square I had only attended one anti-poverty march in front of the state capital. Through this last year I have attended seven or eight marches wearing my clerical collar and representing the voice of Christians speaking truth to power.

I had never heard of International Service Center prior to coming here. Now I enthusiastically support their refugee ministries. My wife and I have added them to our list of non-profits we support. I believe ISC is the most transformational ministry of Market Square. I am much more aware of refugee struggles and able to use my voice and position as an ally.

Finally, I can't speak highly enough about how wonderful this church staff is. Having worked in larger and smaller churches with a variety of staffs, I can assert that the healthy, high-trust dynamics of this staff are exceptional. I particularly want to thank David Volkman for his servant-hearted leadership, his sense of humor, and his ability to keep the daily stresses of ministry minimal. I have loved being with this ministry team! To God be the glory!

May we trust that the triune God surrounds us in the Holy dance through which the whole wide constantly moving universe lives and moves and has its being.

As desperate refugees continue to come to our doors, the ability of our diminished staff to serve them will depend largely on the continued support of ISC's wonderful community volunteers like you our most precious partners-in-mission.

However, for the ISC, what remains constant are our humanitarian values and commitment in serving the disadvantaged and underprivileged people of the world. 



### From the Trustees

Never has there been such consternation than that caused by the recent appearance of a pigeon in the sanctuary. Rest easy! It and all 3 of its co-religionists nesting in the belltower are gone.

In brief, the visitor arrived in the sanctuary a day or two early for that week's service. As welcoming as Market Square is, s/he was particularly unwelcome that Sunday during the Rev. Stan Jenkins' candidate service and sermon.

Thanks to truly dedicated work by Facilities Manager Sean Meara, the pigeon was largely sequestered in a ceiling space on Saturday night and the service was incident free. It turns out that the belltower had become a sanctuary for several pigeons. A professional firm was called in to seal it from this occurring again and to clean up well, you know.

As I understand it, "our" pigeon walked unscathed out the atrium doors on Monday morning. Rev. Bruce Humphrey noted that in his 40 years of ministry this was a first for him. And Stan, by the way, knew of the pigeon's presence before taking the pulpit. Our new senior pastor is intrepid!

Of further excitement, I can report that the exterior restoration work should be completed no later than the end of September. Looking at the exterior without scaffolding reveals masonry of truly skilled men and a woman that will ensure we are weather tight for decades to come. (We are also being careful to ensure that our roofs of slate and rubber are in good shape.)

Finally, there remain many capital and maintenance repairs that are underway or listed for action when possible. By the time of publication, I hope the elevator will be long back in service. As the familiar phrase goes, "We are awaiting parts" to restore our otherwise solidly preforming elevator to service.

# Along the River & Beyond: Landscapes by Jonathan Frazier and Carrie Wissler-Thomas

Sunday, September 28 – Sunday, December 14, 2025



Arts on the Square Gallery will open its 2025-2026 exhibit season at Market Square Presbyterian Church on Sunday, September 28, 2025, with a new show featuring landscape paintings by well-known Harrisburg artists Jonathan Frazier and Carrie Wissler-Thomas.

"Along the River & Beyond" will be on display through Sunday, December 14, 2025, in Geneva Hall gallery space on the 4th floor and in the 1st floor atrium adjacent to the sanctuary.

Landscape paintings by Jonathan and Carrie explore favorite and familiar places, and their individual styles are quite complementary. Jonathan is long noted for his landscape focus on the natural world as well as the built environment. Carrie, however, was originally known for figurative oil paintings, but since 1997 she has turned to creating lyrical and shimmering landscapes of the Susquehanna River and of Scotland, where she and her husband travel annually. Jonathan's landscapes also resonate with vibrant color, balancing between representational and impressionistic. For "Along the River & Beyond," his works will include recent oil paintings from New Orleans, the Susquehanna River, and Gettysburg.

A native of Dillsburg, Pa., Jonathan studied at the Maryland Institute, College of Art (MICA) and Kutztown University where he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art. He began exhibiting with the popular Harrisburg area "Seven Lively Artists" group in the 1990s and has had work in competitive juried shows at numerous galleries, including The State Museum of Pennsylvania; the Suzanne H. Arnold Gallery, Lebanon Valley College;

Washington County Museum of Fine Art, Hagerstown, MD, and the Delaplaine Art Center, Frederick, MD. Jonathan is also known as a regional performing musician on voice, keyboard, guitar, Native American flutes, percussion, and hulusi, among others.

Carrie is a longtime arts leader and innovator in the region, having served as the Executive Director of the Art Association of Harrisburg since 1984. In 1988 she founded Harrisburg's annual Gallery Walk, the city-wide celebration of fine arts venues that she

continues to organize. A graduate of Hood College, she holds a Master's degree from Temple University. Carrie has held over 35 solo exhibitions, and her paintings have appeared in many group exhibitions throughout central Pennsylvania. Her works are included in the collections of The State Museum of Pennsylvania, Cozen O'Connor Attorneys in Philadelphia, and Lebanon Valley College, as well as Borthwick Castle and The Port Charlotte Hotel in Scotland. In 1991 Carrie was the recipient of The Distinguished Service to the Arts Award, and in 2005 the recipient of The Arts Advocate Award, both in Harrisburg.

### The Buzz About Bees: Small Creatures, Sacred Work

As we continue our care for creation and our commitment to environmental justice, it's worth turning our attention to the wellness of bees.

Bees are more than just busy insects, they are vital pollinators, playing a key role in the health of our ecosystems and the food we eat. **Nearly 75% of flowering plants and about 35% of the world's food crops depend on pollinators like bees.** Without them, many fruits, vegetables, nuts would disappear from our tables.

Yet bees are in trouble. Habitat loss, pesticide use, climate change, and disease have led to alarming declines in bee populations worldwide.

As caretakers of the earth, we can respond by planting native flowers, avoiding harmful chemicals in our gardens, supporting biodiversity, and advocating for policies that protect pollinators and their habitats.

Caring for the smallest among us is a reflection of the divine love we're called to embody. May we learn from the bees—working together, nurturing life, and creating good health for our planet.

### Fun Facts about Bees

- All WORKER bees are FEMALE. This includes foragers, builders, guards, and nurses.
- The males have only one job—to mate with the queen—and are called drones; they can't even feed themselves. You might think the males have it made, but think again. As soon as the weather starts getting cold, the females push them out of the hive and "shut the door."
- Forager bees sometimes fall asleep in flowers at the end of the day, exhausted from a hard day's work. (See photos at right)
- On average, one worker honeybee produces about 1/12 (that's one twelfth!) of a teaspoon her entire life (lifespans are 4-6 weeks in summer, 4-6 months in winter). That means, one 16 oz. bottle of honey was produced by more than 1,100 bees. Remember that next time you use honey; it's precious stuff.

In July 2025, Session held a joint board meeting with the Deacons, Trustees, Pastor Nominating Committee, Pastors, and Bridge Operations Manager. Updates on the activities and achievements of each group or individual since the beginning of 2025 were heard. The group also discussed how to welcome and integrate the Reverend Stan Jenkins and his wife the Reverend Leslie Mott into the life of the church. Each group was congratulated on their hard work during this extended transition period. The staff were also thanked for their leadership and dedication. Dave Volkman was given kudos for the incredible gift of time and talent that he has given to the church as a volunteer Building Operations Manager.

In August, Session's activities included:

### Worship

- 1) Approved the baptism of Catherine Margot Boyer on September 14, 2025. She was born on September 5, 2023 and is the daughter of Jared and Elsa Boyer. The Rev. Allison Smith will officiate.
- 2) Re-authorized the Organ Scholar position for the 2025-2026 academic year on the same terms as the current year, funding having been provided by a donor-designated gift. <u>Background:</u> Ethan Draper will serve as Organ Scholar for the nine month period beginning September 2025 and continuing through May 2026.

### **Christian Education**

3) Learned that Market Square will combine its Sunday School classes for youth with Pine Street Presbyterian and Grace United Methodist churches this fall. About twelve youth from all three churches are currently eligible to participate.

### **Faith and Justice**

4) Agreed to dedicate 25% of the annual Peace and Global Witness offering to the International Service Center. (This is the amount that the Presbyterian Church (USA) permits churches to retain for local purposes.) The remaining funds will support the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s peacemaking, reconciliation and global witness ministries. The offering will be collected on October 5, 2025.

### **Membership**

- 5) Recognized the death of Ruling Elder Nancy Adams Besch who died on August 13, 2025. She joined Market Square on June 4, 2000, having been ordained an elder in 1992. A memorial service will take place on Saturday, September 6, at 3:00 pm in the sanctuary and will be officiated by the Reverend Anne M. Ross.
- 6) Received three new members on August 3, 2025:
  - · Christian Alander (7472), by profession of faith
  - Jeff Dershem (7473), by profession of faith
  - Joyce Kieffer (7474), by profession of faith
- 7) Received an update on the Sessions' project to contact 65 inactive members. To date:
  - 14 people asked to be kept on the membership rolls;
  - 16 people have been removed from rolls; and
  - 35 people are still in the process of being contacted.

Session members hope to complete making calls by the end of August.

- 8) Authorized Pastor Anne Ross to form new Covenant Groups as needed.
- 9) At their request, removed the following people from church membership:

### **Facility**

12) Authorized the expenditure of \$19,391 from the Investment Fund to supplement the previously approved appropriation by Session for Phase 2 of the exterior renovation. <u>Background:</u>

Additional stone and bricks were needed to address worse than anticipated problems on the church's Blackberry and River Street façades. (It was noted that the façade's brick is actually two bricks thick, thus some damage could not be seen when the original estimates were prepared.) Additional painting was also included.


13) Authorized the expenditure of up to \$3,500 to BioOne from the Ellie Allen Fund for the Homeless to clean church property from human waste and trash left overnight by homeless individuals so that Witmer Construction can continue its work in a safe, clean environment. <a href="Background:">Background:</a> Human waste was found nearly every morning creating a health and safety issue for Witmer Construction workers (stopping Witmer's work for several days.) BioOne services: Clean and sanitize areas affected by human waste. Areas will be treated with sanitizer and enzymes, and then washed down with high pressure water. Exterior stairway handrails will be sanitized. Cleaning will occur Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

14) Authorized the expenditure of up to \$7,239 from the Carl Petersheim Music Fund to clean the sanctuary pipe organ following infestation of pigeons in the bell tower and sanctuary.

### **Personnel**

15) Agreed to hire Sidney Dame as a nursery childcare provider. She will begin August 10, 2025. She replaces Lizzie Camilli who is now attending college.

Below is an email that arrived from a younger brother of Yazan Meqbil—Amro, 17—who just graduated from his high school in the West Bank. While the entire West Bank is a very dangerous place for all, their community of Beit Ommer is especially dangerous as it is now surrounded by three huge Israeli settlements so Israeli soldiers are ever present day and night. In this message, Amro refers to the loss of his best friend, his first cousin and his next door neighbor Abdul Ramen, who was standing by innocently when he was killed two years ago by an Israeli sniper from some distance. This is not uncommon and no IDF soldier tends to be held accountable. The impact on Amro continues to be understandably profound; but Amro, having passed his final exams under the circumstances, is all the more heroic and remarkable - and no less important as most of the Meqbil kids have always been at the top of their classes. His message brings home what those living in the West Bank deal with every day and night; parents Jamal and Saddiya take turns sleeping at night so one of them remains watchful; twice their home has been invaded by large groups of soldiers, and as Amro explains, it remains a constant fear. The focus remains on Gaza, as it should, but we cannot forget the everyday hell that the West Bank is as well for Palestinians.

I hope you are all well. I would like to inform you that my high school results were released yesterday, and thank God I passed, with a GPA of 70.3. I thank God always and for everything, but I am not at all satisfied with my grade. It was a very difficult year, and it is one of the years I wish I could erase from my memory. I faced problems concentrating and sleeping. Also, during the war and missile attacks, I was unable to study properly. Most nights, soldiers would roam the neighborhood, and I would lie awake, fearing they would raid our house and arrest me. They used the method of arresting high school students this year to damage their future. Since the martyrdom of my lifelong friend and cousin, Abdulrahman, at the beginning of the war, my life has completely changed. I have begun to take neurological medication. This medication has altered my appearance, and I have gained a lot of weight as a result. I expect it played a major role in the concentration problems I suffered from last year. Abdulrahman's result was supposed to be released with mine. We had dreamed together and planned for our future together, but yesterday I received the result alone. I know that I should be satisfied and proud that I succeeded under these circumstances, but I cannot control my feelings.


