Parking Process

The church does not own the Market Square Garage but we pay for worship service parking. You will receive the first of two exit tickets when you press the button to enter the garage. **Please do not misplace that first ticket; if you do, the garage will charge you a \$32 lost ticket fee which is your responsibility to pay.** In order to exit the garage at no cost to you, you must obtain a second ticket with the number 2 written on it. At the exit machine, wait until the gate comes down, then insert the ticket you received when entering the garage, bar code facing up. When the machine asks for payment, insert the ticket you received from the church, bar code up. If you have any kind of problem, press the telephone icon on the exit gate machine and tell the call center representative that you are at the Market Square Garage and your validated exit ticket is not working. Children's Ministry

Children of all ages are always welcome! There are two shelves in our Narthex (at the back of the Sanctuary) with sequin boards, crayons, markers, coloring sheets, and puzzles as well as a few library books that go along with the theme of the worship service. On typical Sundays immediately following the children's sermon (around 11:15 a.m.), education for children K-6 is offered in the Children's Education Room (Level 4). On Sundays, nursery care is available for children (infants through 5-year-olds) in the nursery on the fourth floor. The nursery is staffed by Sidney Dame, our nursery caregiver, and volunteers.

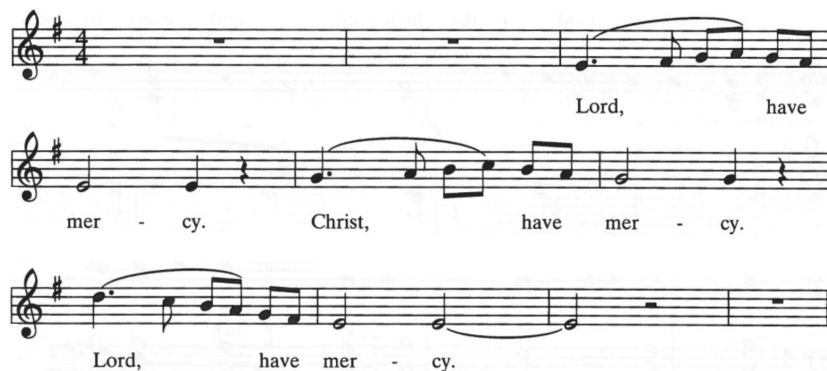

Music Notes This Week

Herbert Howells, one of the foremost English composers of the 20th century, is especially remembered for his rich and expressive sacred music. His Psalm-Preludes for organ, written in the years following World War I, are deeply meditative works that draw their inspiration from specific verses of the Psalms. “Psalm-Prelude No. 1” reflects on Psalm 34:6: “this poor man cried, and the Lord heard him, and saved him out of all his troubles.” With its long, flowing lines and slowly unfolding harmonies, the piece conveys both the cry of human need and the quiet assurance of God’s saving presence.

The ancient Irish text, “Be Thou My Vision,” is probably one of the most cherished hymns of the church, offering a prayer that Christ would be our guide, our wisdom, and our true inheritance. Bob Chilcott, a British composer and former singer with the King’s Singers, has composed a fresh and deeply expressive choral setting of this beloved hymn. His arrangement preserves the simplicity of the traditional melody while surrounding it with lush harmonies and gentle lyricism. Hopefully, it will be both a personal and communal prayer this morning.

Our responsive hymn, “Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love,” was written by Ghanaian church leader Tom Colvin in 1969 and is rooted in the example of Christ washing the disciples’ feet. Its words remind us that true Christian service is found in humble acts of love for our neighbors. The tune, CHEREPONI, comes from Ghana as well, giving the hymn a gentle, folk-like character that is both prayerful and inviting. Together, the text and tune call us to embody Christ’s servant love in our daily lives and in our life together as the church.

“How Firm a Foundation” is one of the most enduring hymns of our Christian faith, first appearing in an American hymnal in 1787. Its text celebrates the strength and sufficiency of God’s promises, assuring believers that God’s Word provides an unshakable foundation for life and faith. Alice Parker, composer and arranger, devoted her long career to the vitality of congregational song, crafting arrangements that highlight both the beauty of the tune and the meaning of the text. In this setting, she brings out the warmth and strength of the familiar melody, inviting singers and listeners alike to rest in the steadfast love of God.

Our sending hymn, “God of Grace and God of Glory,” was written by American pastor Harry Emerson Fosdick in 1930 and is a stirring hymn that calls the church to courage, wisdom, and faithfulness in the face of life’s challenges. (Let’s be real – there are a lot of challenges going on currently, right?!) Its prayerful text asks God to grant strength “for the facing of this hour” and to banish fears that keep us from bold discipleship. The tune, CWM RHONDDA, composed by Welsh musician John Hughes, gives the hymn its powerful and uplifting character, with a sweeping melody that has made it one of the most beloved hymns of the twentieth century.

Music next week – The Sanctuary Choir will sing, “Poor Man Lazrus” arranged by Jester Hairston and “In Paradisum” from Gabriel Fauré’s Requiem. The hymns for the morning will be, “Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise,” “Within Your Shelter, Loving God,” and “Give Praise to the Lord.”

Cover Art

The text on today's bulletin cover is Luke 16:8-9 as it appears in "The Message," a paraphrase of the Bible in contemporary language by Eugene Peterson (1932-2018), a Presbyterian minister, scholar, theologian, author, and poet. Peterson's goal was to make the Bible "current, fresh, and understandable." The work was thoroughly reviewed by a team of recognized Old and New Testament scholars to ensure that it is accurate and faithful to the original languages. The artwork is cut paper by Br. Martin Erspamer, SM, noted liturgical artist from St. Meinrad Archabbey in southern Indiana.

On Sunday, October 5, 2025, we will join Christians around the world in celebrating World Communion Sunday and dedicating the Peace & Global Witness Offering. This special offering strengthens peace-making efforts locally, regionally, and globally.

- 50% supports worldwide peacemaking through the Presbyterian Mission Agency.
- 25% goes to the Presbytery of Carlisle to assist local helping agencies within our region.
- The remaining 25% is retained by congregations to be used or shared locally.

This year, at the recommendation of the Peacemaking Committee, the Faith and Justice Committee has designated our congregation's local share for the International Service Center (ISC), which is housed in our church.

The ISC is under great strain this year. Executive Orders targeting refugees and asylum-seekers have severely affected its work, leading to funding shortfalls and the looming loss of 16 full-time staff positions. Your gifts will directly help sustain this vital ministry, which provides critical support to vulnerable neighbors seeking refuge and safety.

Organ Concert – September 28, 4:00 pm

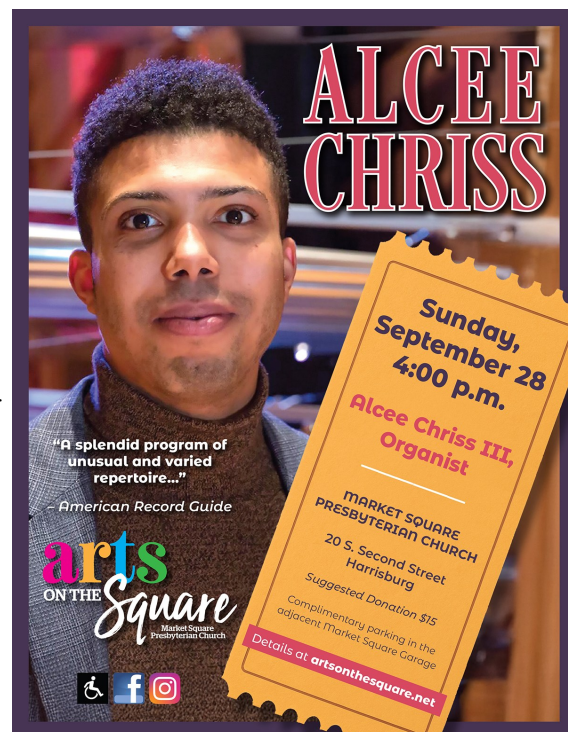
Alcee Chriss III
